



Lesson 5: “An Invitation to Receive Mercy and Grace”

Online Crew Club Plan

<u>Key Teaching Point</u>	I’m invited to receive mercy and grace from God.
<u>Bible Verse</u>	“Don’t you see how wonderfully kind, tolerant, and patient God is with you? Does this mean nothing to you? Can’t you see that his kindness is intended to turn you from your sin?” (Romans 2:4, NLT)
<u>Bible Passage</u>	“Jesus shows grace” (John 8:1-11, NLT)
<u>Materials</u>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A Bible • A dollar bill
<u>Mystery Bag (Optional)</u>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A sheet of red construction paper and and sheet of green construction paper, or as needed to cut eight cards of each color • A scissors to cut out eight cards of each color

Relate (10 minutes)

Welcome students.

Greet crew members as they sign on.

Icebreaker Options (Choose one.):

- God sightings: Ask students to describe how they’ve seen God at work in their

school or at their home in the past week.

- Rosebud: Ask students to share a highlight or success from the week (a rose), a challenge or disappointment from the week (a thorn) and something they are looking forward to doing or experiencing in the week ahead (a bud).
- Open a discussion with the question, “Have you ever been caught doing something you shouldn’t have been doing? What happened? How did the person who caught you respond?”

Play a game.

Guess Who?

Ask for one student to be the “mystery person.”– Choose a famous person or a character the kids likely know, such as Mickey Mouse, Captain America, Justin Bieber, etc. The leader should send the name of the person or character in the chat to each person EXCEPT the mystery person. Before you send the name in the chat, make sure to instruct the students NOT to read it out loud! Then, the student who is the mystery person will ask *yes-or-no* questions to the group to try and figure out who they are. If they guess correctly with ten questions or fewer, they win! Adjust the number of questions to change the level of difficulty.

Receive (10 minutes)

Read God’s Word.

Encourage students to follow along with the story in one of the following ways:

1. Play a stationary game of Red Light, Green Light: Ask students to stand up in an open area in front of their camera so they still can see and hear you. Ask them to start walking in place every time GO or GOING is mentioned and to freeze in place when the word STOP or STOPPED is mentioned.
2. Mystery Bag option: Give each student one red card and one green card in their mystery bag. Ask them to hold up the red card every time the word STOP or STOPPED is mentioned, and to hold up the green card every time the word GO or GOING is mentioned.

Early one morning, Jesus was GOING past the temple when he ran into a crowd of people, so he STOPPED and sat down to teach them about God’s kingdom. As he was GOING about his teaching, a group of experts in the law and religious leaders STOPPED by to bring a woman before Jesus that they had caught sinning against God’s commandments.

They placed the woman in front of the entire crowd and said to Jesus: “We caught this woman sinning against God, and the law says that we are to GO and throw stones at such a person. Teacher, what do you say we should do?”

Jesus knew they were trying to trick him into saying something that would break the law, so Jesus STOPPED what he was doing, bent down, and started to write in the dust on the ground with his finger.

The law experts and the religious leaders became frustrated with Jesus’s silence, so they demanded that Jesus answer them. So Jesus stood up and said: “All right, GO ahead, but let the one who has never sinned GO and throw the first stone!” Then, he knelt down and wrote in the dust again.

As Jesus was writing in the dust, each one of the experts of the law and the religious leaders walked away, starting with the oldest person until only Jesus was left in front of the crowd with the woman.

Jesus STOPPED writing in the dust and stood up again and asked the woman, “Where did they all GO? Didn’t even one of them STOP to condemn you?”

“No Lord,” she said.

So Jesus replied: “Neither do I. GO and sin no more.”



Respond (10 minutes)

Apply God’s Truth.

What is Mercy?

Ask students: How do you feel after doing something you know was wrong?

After we do something wrong, we often fear the punishment and consequences that will follow our actions that we know we deserve. This is mercy: when we don’t receive the punishment or consequences that we deserve when we do wrong or mess up.

How did the woman receive mercy in today’s story?

Take student responses.

We all deserve to be punished for our sin but God, in his great mercy, doesn't punish us for our sin. God is holy and perfect and he can't just forget about sin so Jesus took our place and our punishment for sins upon himself. We experience God's mercy because of Jesus!

What is Grace?

Hold up a dollar bill.¹

- **What's this?** (A dollar bill.)
- **What are some different ways you can get a dollar bill?** (Earn it, steal it, borrow it, have someone give it to you, etc.)

There are different ways you could get a dollar bill. But who does THIS dollar bill belong to?

Take student responses.

Me! So, what can I do with this dollar bill?

Take student responses.

I have the right to do whatever I want with this, because it belongs to me.

Select a student in the group and tell them you'd like to give it to them as a gift. Emphasize that they didn't do anything special to earn it, nor do they have to do anything to receive it. It's just a gift from you. Ask the student who received the dollar:

- **How did you feel about receiving this dollar bill?**
- **Did you expect to get this when you came to club today?**
- **Did you do anything to earn it?**

Ask the rest of the group:

- **Have you ever received a gift like this (unexpected, unearned)?**
- **Who gave it to you? How did you feel?**

God's grace is like that dollar bill. It is something that he gives freely, and we don't earn it by our own good behavior or anything we do.

Read Ephesians 2:8-9 from a Bible.

¹ You could substitute this for a \$5 bill to make the gift more valuable, but it's recommended to not give away any amount more valuable to avoid students becoming distracted.

“God saved you by his grace when you believed. And you can’t take credit for this; it is a gift from God. Salvation is not a reward for the good things we have done, so none of us can boast about it.” (NLT)

How did the woman in today’s story experience God’s grace?

Take student responses.

Jesus treated the woman better than she deserved. The law experts and the religious leaders left feeling guilty for their sin, but the woman left with these words of Jesus over her life: “Go and sin no more.” Even though this woman deserved to be called out as a sinner, Jesus called her out as someone who could turn away from her sin, not because of her own ability but because of God’s kindness!

Read Romans 2:4 from the Bible.

“Don’t you see how wonderfully kind, tolerant, and patient God is with you? Does this mean nothing to you? Can’t you see that his kindness is intended to turn you from your sin?” (Romans 2:4, NLT).

If we are going to receive this invitation of God’s grace and mercy, we have to bring our sin before God just like this woman’s sins were brought before Jesus. God’s grace and mercy means everything to those who know that they don’t deserve anything that God’s kindness has to offer. For this reason, Jesus offers sinners an invitation to receive grace and mercy, and this kindness changes us from the inside out!

Close in prayer together.

Instruct students to hold their hands in front of them with both palms facing up.

God’s grace is a gift. We can’t do anything to earn it, not by doing good things or by being sorry enough. It’s something we receive from God simply because he loves us.

As you hold out your hands, close your eyes and pray silently. Think about one way that God might be giving you a fresh start to love and obey him. Receive God’s grace as a gift.

Take any additional prayer requests and close the group in prayer.
