



Lesson 5: God is Healer Online Plan

<u>Key Teaching Point</u>	God heals, and he cares for me when I am hurting.
<u>Bible Verse</u>	“O Lord, if you heal me, I will be truly healed; if you save me, I will be truly saved.” (Jeremiah 17:14a, NLT)
<u>Scripture Passage</u>	“God heals Naaman.” (2 Kings 5, NLT)
<u>Materials</u>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Bible • 05: “God is Healer” Zoom Slides
<u>Mystery Bag (Optional)</u>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • One or two band-aids per student • One fine-tip colored marker per student

Relate (10 minutes)

Welcome crew members.

Greet crew members as they sign on.

Icebreaker Options (choose one):

- Ask students to share their highs and lows (the best and worst things that happened to them either today or from the past week.)
- Rosebud: Ask students to share a highlight or success from the week (a rose), a challenge or disappointment from the week (a thorn) and something they are looking forward to doing or experiencing in the week ahead (a bud).
- Open a discussion with a question, “What helps you when you're feeling sick or hurting?”

Play a game.

Students will need to grab a piece of paper and a pencil (or they can use their computer). Ask a series of questions and instruct the students not to share their answers aloud, but to write them down with a pen or pencil. They can share their answers with you by holding it up to the screen or you could ask students to verbally share their responses. Whoever correctly answered the most trivia questions wins!

Trivia questions:

- How many legs does a spider have? (Eight)
- What is the first book in the Bible? (Genesis)
- Which metal is heavier, silver or gold? (Gold)
- How many sides does a hexagon have? (Six)
- What is the tallest mountain in the world? (Mount Everest)
- What is a baby goat called? (A kid)
- If you freeze water, what do you get? (Ice)
- What is the fastest land animal? (The cheetah)
- How many colors are in the rainbow? (Seven)

Receive (10 minutes)

Read God's Word.

Opening: Open with a personal story about your worst memory of being sick.

I'm sure you all have stories about being sick! Today's story is about a guy who had a terrible disease that you and I have never had. People a long time ago used to get a skin disease called leprosy. Leprosy was a terrible skin disease that people suffered from in the ancient world. There was no cure for it and it was very contagious. So I'm going to need you to listen in the story, and every time you hear the word "leprosy" I want you to act it out by pretending to scratch all over your body.

Practice together and teach the rest of the cue words and actions:

LEPROSY - scratching motions all over body

HEAL/HEALING/HEALED - hands in the air in amazement

PROPHET - trumpet (like a messenger) Explain the term prophet: A prophet was a man of God who delivered God's messages to the people. This was before they had God's Word written down for them to read, and so they heard God's Word from his prophets

KING/MASTER - Bowing motion

So, listen as I read this true story from the Bible (hold up a Bible) **and be ready to act out your cues!**

Naaman was a mighty warrior from a kingdom called Aramea who suffered from a terrible skin disease called LEPROSY.

Naaman's family had a young servant girl who had been captured during a war with the nation of Israel. The young girl felt compassion for her MASTER who had been struck with LEPROSY, and she said "I wish my MASTER would go to see the PROPHET in Samaria. He

would HEAL him of his LEPROSY.”

So Naaman told the KING, his MASTER, what the young girl from Israel had said about a chance for him to be HEALED. “Go and visit the PROPHET,” the KING told him. “I will send a letter of introduction for you to take to the KING of Israel.” So Naaman started out, carrying as gifts 750 pounds of silver, 150 pounds of gold, and ten sets of clothing. The letter to the KING of Israel from the KING of Aram said: “With this letter I present my servant Naaman. I want you to HEAL him of his LEPROSY.”

When the KING of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes in dismay and said, “Am I God, that I can give life and take it away? Why is this KING asking me to HEAL someone with LEPROSY? I can see that he’s just trying to pick a fight with me.”

But there was a man of God named Elisah who was a PROPHET. He heard that the KING of Israel had torn his clothes in dismay, he sent this message to him: “Why are you so upset? Send Naaman to me, and he will learn that there is a true PROPHET here in Israel.”

So Naaman went to see if he could be HEALED and took his horses and chariots and waited at the door of the PROPHET Elisha’s house. But Elisha sent a messenger out to him with this message: “Go and wash yourself seven times in the Jordan River. Then your skin will be restored, and you will be HEALED of your LEPROSY.”

But Naaman became angry and stalked away. “I thought he would certainly come out to meet me!” he said. “I expected him to wave his hand over the LEPROSY and call on the name of the Lord his God and HEAL me! Aren’t the rivers of Damascus, the Abana and the Pharpar, better than any of the rivers of Israel? Why shouldn’t I wash in them and be HEALED?” So Naaman turned and went away from the PROPHET’S house in a rage.

But his officers tried to reason with him and said, “MASTER, if the PROPHET had told you to do something very difficult, wouldn’t you have done it? So you should certainly obey him when he tells you to do something easy like, ‘Go and wash and be HEALED!’” So Naaman went down to the Jordan River and dipped himself seven times, as the PROPHET had instructed him. And his LEPROSY vanished! His skin became as healthy as the skin of a young child, and he was HEALED!

Then Naaman and his entire party went back to find the PROPHET Elisha. They stood before him, and Naaman said, “Now I know that there is no God in all the world except in Israel. No doctor, not even a KING could save me from my LEPROSY! God is the true HEALER!

God saved Naaman when no one else could help him. That’s who God is - God is Healer. What does God heal us from?

Take student responses.



Respond (10 minutes)

Apply God's truth.

Open a discussion:

- **How do you think having a disease like leprosy affected Naaman's life?** (Answers will vary.)
- **How do you think Naaman felt when he found out the King of Israel couldn't help him?** (Discouraged, sad, upset, etc.)
- **How did Elisha show that he was a true prophet of God?** (He delivered God's message to Naaman, God showed his power to heal through Elisha)
- **What did Naaman have to do to be healed?** (He had to follow Elisha's instructions to wash in the river.)
- **What do you think might have happened if Naaman didn't follow Elisha's instructions?** (Answers will vary.)
- **What did Naaman learn about the God of Israel?** (God is the one true God, he is Healer)
- **How does God heal people today?** (God sometimes chooses to heal people when we pray in faith.)

Review the Bible verse.

Jeremiah was a prophet of God. He tells us that God is the true Healer. In the story today, Naaman went to look for healing from some different places. Where did he look for healing?

Take student responses.

Naaman thought the king of Israel could help him, and he also was expecting the prophet Elisha to heal him. He may have looked for healing beforehand from his own king, or doctors in his own land. But no one could give him true healing except God. What else does the verse say God does? (God saves.)

What kinds of things do people need to be healed or saved from?

Take student responses.

Ultimate healing from sickness, pain, sadness, or any kind of trouble comes from God the Healer. He takes things that are sick or broken in our lives and makes them healthy. He doesn't just heal our bodies, but he heals our hearts. Jeremiah said God can truly save us. He can heal us from bad habits, wrong choices we've made, problems in our relationships, etc. God heals us inside and out!

Pull up the Zoom slides for lesson five and share your screen. Go through each of the slides one by one and discuss the following:

- **How might God heal someone from _____?**
- **What would the person be like before and after God's healing?**

Close in prayer together.

When we need healing, God wants us to pray to him in faith. He has the power to heal and he wants us to pray to him believing in his power.

When we pray for healing, God sometimes answers yes and heals us, like in the story of Naaman. But sometimes, God says no or wait. Does that mean God doesn't care? No. Does it mean he can't heal us? No. Does it mean we shouldn't pray? No. No matter how God answers our prayers, we can trust that he is good. God wants us to pray to him with faith. That means when we are healed or sick, we believe that he is still in control and has a good plan for us.

Do you know anyone who is sick or has an injury that we can pray for?¹

Take prayer requests and close in prayer.

¹ Provide students with one or two band-aids in a mystery bag along with a fine-tip colored marker. Ask them to write down the names of people they will be praying for. Encourage them to keep them somewhere where they can use it as a reminder to pray for them.
